## IDENTIFICATION

	Cathedral, Community House		
III	Such a resource contributes to the environmental quality or cultural significance of a larger area and fulfils one of the criteria set out in section 3(3) of the Act but that does not fulfill the criteria for Grade II status. Grade III sites may be formally protected by placement on the Heritage Register. These resources are currently managed by HWC unless the local authority has been found competent and has been granted delegated authority.		
IIIA	Such a resource must be an excellent example of its kind or must be sufficiently rare.  These are heritage resources which are significant in the context of an area.	This grading is applied to buildings and sites that have sufficient intrinsic significance to be regarded as local heritage resources; and are significant enough to warrant that any alteration, both internal and external, is regulated. Such buildings and sites may be representative, being excellent examples of their kind, or may be rare. In either case, they should receive maximum protection at local level.	High Significance
IIIB	Such a resource might have similar significances to those of a Grade III A resource, but to a lesser degree.  These are heritage resources which are significant in the context of a townscape, neighbourhood, settlement or community.	Like Grade IIIA buildings and sites, such buildings and sites may be representative, being excellent examples of their kind, or may be rare, but less so than Grade IIIA examples. They would receive less stringent protection than Grade IIIA buildings and sites at local level.	Medium Significance
IIIC	Such a resource is of contributing significance to the environs  These are heritage resources which are significant in the context of a streetscape or direct neighbourhood.	This grading is applied to buildings and/or sites whose significance is contextual, i.e. in large part due to its contribution to the character or significance of the environs.  These buildings and sites should, as a consequence, only be regulated if the significance of the environs is sufficient to warrant protective measures, regardless of whether the site falls within a Conservation or Heritage Area. Internal alterations should not necessarily be regulated.	Low Significance
NCW	A resource that, after appropriate investigation, has been determined to not have enough heritage significance to be retained as part of the National Estate.	No further actions under the NHRA are required. This must be motivated by the applicant and approved by the authority. Section 34 can even be lifted by HWC for structures in this category if they are older than 60 years.	No research potential or other cultural significance

General Protections cover any resources that <u>could be</u> significant **60 year rule (HWC deals with approximately 3000 applications/year)** Archaeology, Palaeontology and Meteorites Development and Mining



# Heritage and Scenic Landscapes SPLUMA (2013) and LUPA (2014)

Provincial Sense of Place, Heritage and Cultural Landscapes must be protected, managed and enhanced.

- Landscape setting and edge conditions, e.g. topographical containment, agricultural edges
- Scale and hierarchy, e.g. town, village and hamlet
- Geometry, e.g. linear, grid and informal
- Grain and texture, e.g. subdivision, street blocks, setbacks, built form
- Distinctive rural morphology, e.g. river farmlands, agricultural allotments
- Public realm, e.g. main street, public spaces
- Planting patterns and role of water, e.g. leiwater

## **HWC Heritage Register Process**

#### Grade IIIA

#### Proposed Clause in Local Zoning Scheme

No grade IIIA building or structure approved by HWC as such shall be demolished, altered or extended internally or externally, nor shall any new building or structure be erected on the property occupied by such building or structure without the Municipality's special consent; and the Municipality shall not grant its special consent if such proposed demolition, alteration, extension or new building or structure will be detrimental to the character and/or significance of the graded building or structure or the environment or the Heritage Area in which it is located.

#### **Grade IIIB**

#### Proposed Clause in Local Zoning Scheme

No grade IIIB building or structure approved by HWC as such shall be demolished, altered or extended externally, nor shall any new building or structure be erected on the property occupied by such building or structure without the Municipality's special consent; and the Municipality shall not grant its special consent if such proposed demolition, alteration, extension or new building or structure will be detrimental to the character and/or significance of the graded building or structure or the environment or the Heritage Area in which it is located.

#### Grade III C


#### **Proposed Clause in Local Zoning Scheme**

No building or structure which is graded IIIC and entered on the Heritage Register as such shall be demolished or externally altered or extended, nor shall any new building or structure which is visible from the street be erected on the property occupied by such building or structure without the special consent of the Municipality, and the Municipality shall not grant its special consent if such demolition, alteration or extension or new building or structure will detract from the heritage significance of the environment or Heritage Area in which such building or structure is located.

# HWC Process for lifting section 34 (never before!)

## Process for lifting Section 34 of the NHRA TWK submits Inventory to HWC HWC approves Inventory TWK consults with owners of buildings proposed for placement on the register TWK ensures that all significant (graded) heritage resources within a surveyed area have been formally protected through placement on the Heritage Register TWK drafts letter to HWC requesting that Section 34 be lifted for the surveyed area in terms of section 34(3) of the NHRA. HWC does not agree with request HWC agrees with request HWC drafts Gazette Notice - Gazette Notice translated into 3 TWK liaise with HWC regarding any languages - Approved by HWC Council - Published in potential concerns **Provincial Gazette** HWC sends TWK a copy of the Gazette Notice All decisions for this area will be taken by TWK once gazette is published, unless structure is on the Heritage Area

## **HWC Heritage Area Process**

#### Heritage Area Proposed Clause in Local Zoning Scheme

- (1) The following provisions shall apply within an area listed in the Table hereunder and depicted on the Zoning Map as being a Heritage Area:
  - no building or structure other than an internal wall or partition therein shall be demolished, altered or erected unless written application has been made to the Municipality and the Municipality has granted its special consent thereto;
- (ii) the Municipality shall not give its special consent if such demolition, alteration, extension or erection, as the case may be, will be detrimental to the protection and/or maintenance and/or enhancement of the architectural, aesthetic and/or historical character and/or significance, as the case may be, of the area in which such demolition, alteration, extension or erection is proposed.

Or

(2) The Guidelines appended hereto as Appendix: Heritage Area and approved by HWC on (date) shall apply within an area listed in the Table hereunder and depicted on the Zoning Map as being a Heritage Area.
